Treatment of Burn has been improving every year. S. Changole et al from Govt. Medical College, Nagpur on page 279 present a comparative study of efficacy of human placental extract over beta glucan collagen sheets in partial thickness burn patients. They have shown that the treatment by human placental extract (HPE) is cost effective compared to beta glucan collagen (BGC) sheets dressing. BGC dressing results in less hospital stay, reduced healing time and reduced pain score.

Rectal Foreign Body has been known for a long time. On page 320 Minakshi Gadhire et al from LTM Medical College and LTM General Hospital are presenting a case of Rectal Foreign body, which was a glass bottle.
